


Message from the Editor

TALES FROM THE DIOCESE

1. MOSCOW 1998: INTO THE WOODS

You have probably all heard of "Into the Woods", a Stephen Sondheim musical which features much loved fairy tales. My memory of it is not the songs or the scenery but the interval. The first half had finished, Cinderella was united with her prince, as was Snow White: Red Riding Hood had escaped the wolf and Jack had killed the giant at the top of the beanstalk. We had reached the happy ending: where was there to go now?

The second half was merciless. Everything fell to pieces, mainly because the Giant's widow came down the beanstalk to seek revenge, destroying and killing. Leaving a Wasteland.

Those of us who were living in Moscow in the later 1990s were in the same position as that audience during the interval. Communism was finished. Russia was dear friends with the rest of the world. Glasnost! Perestroika! Western businesses were moving in: McDonalds, KFC, Hush Puppy, Baskin Robbins - there was even a British Home Stores in the best shopping street. Everything was wonderful with a glorious future beckoning. Then the Giant's wife started down the beanstalk.

Things started to crack gradually. The Mafia started to demand ever larger percentages from Western businesses, culminating in the day-light killing of a Western businessman whose company had been trying to negotiate a reduction in the Mafia percentage. Banks collapsed and started paying staff and customers in tangible assets: on one occasion I nearly got run over by a man pushing a Controller chair down a Main Street. Elderly Russians who had lived through the worst of Stalinism, trusting that they would be looked after in their old age, found themselves destitute. The new Western businesses started to close down.

The other destitute group were thirdworld students. Under communism large numbers had been granted 'scholarships' to Lamumba University. This amounted to board, lodging and tuition as well as a single ticket to Moscow from their homecountry. This was originally a scheme to spread communism to the developing countries and the collapse of communism led to the collapse of the scholarships, leaving hundreds without support or the ability to work or the means to buy a ticket home. Most of them came from countries too poor to repatriate them. I will always remember the shock of finding a young West African man, wearing a serape and sombrero, crouching outside a Mexican restaurant and repeating '!Hola!'

The one stable institution throughout this was St Andrew's Church. It was the only non-Orthodox church permitted to operate at the time and it spread its wings to take in anyone who wished. Roman Catholics had to attend mass in the US embassy but we had a large grey gothic church looking as if it had been magically transported from the Home Counties and desperately out of place in the middle of Moscow, surrounded as it was by Golden Onion Domes.

Just a few years ago, the Bishop's appeal was for funds to provide a kitchen for St Andrews, which seemed mystifying until you realise that they are clearly still supporting those in need.

You might ask why it was left to the Anglican Church to provide such support, regardless of race, religion or politics. If so, you have not been attending to your Bible! There was also the fact that it was the ONLY church permitted to operate at that time and, if they did nothing, no one else would.

Introducing Gail, 'the bag lady'

I spent much of my childhood with my maternal grandmother, a seamstress by trade, and I was fascinated by the process of turning a piece of fabric into a garment or decorative household item.

By the age of four she had begun to teach me to make simple things sewing by hand, making cloth dolls from scraps with buttoned, removable clothes. I was told not to throw away the scraps as they would come in useful one day!!!

I moved onto the sewing machine at around seven using the handle to move the needle not the treadle. Years passed and at the age of eleven I was given my first electric sewing machine and by now I could design and cut simple patterns myself.

Moving on to teacher training college my main subject was Needlework and Design. My straight stitch machine was not suitable for machine embroidery so I bought one that, at the time did everything - even sewing buttons on!

Over the years I have designed and made costumes for school productions, fancy dress, mystery plays and here in Spain costumes for the Fila de Maseros.





The technique for the patchwork bags was shown to me by a German friend and I have sewn many over the years, adapting the log cabin design to give variation.

The bags are made from clean re-cycled fabrics and the denim has been donated by a friend (whose business is denim) and is from half pairs of jeans, in the main, samples. There must be many people wearing the other half around Europe.

The bags can be constructed to the customers colour order. All monies are donated to the Chaplaincy, my contribution is my time and skill.

God, the Natural World.

'Each of us is a masterpiece of God's creation'- Pope Francis

I hope that his Holiness the Pope, will not mind me using his quote. Adding into it the Natural World and the Animal Kingdom.

I want to share a little journey with you, that encompasses, some Historicity, Philosophy and Theology: principally in thinking about God and Nature.

May I start with Animism, the most primitive of religions, around before any of the Organised Religions were formed. Our ancestors, including 'ancient man' had some idea about the power of God, which controlled their lives.



Some of the evidence is found on the most ancient of Cave Drawings, if one can find them. It was a form of Animism.

Animism is the belief that objects, places and creatures all possess a distinct spiritual essence. It perceives all things - animals, plants, rocks, rivers, weather systems and human handiwork, having agency and freewill. It is quite possible that some of the ancestors of the ancient tribes today, still follow its beliefs and practices. E.g in Medieval England, when the weather was very thundery and stormy, some believed, that it was God 'being angry'.

The first of the organised religions is Hinduism, they worship One God. Their Gita (Scripture) says there is only god who is omnipresent and included in everything. But they have forms that they may use to aid their worship and some of them in part, can include animal forms e.g Ganesha (Elephant).

The next is Buddhism, and they teach that it's wrong to kill anything. They will not eat anything 'sentient', (living creature with a nervous system) and so they mostly follow a 'vegan' style of diet.

Let me say something about the Abrahamic religions from the Bible, especially, Judaism and Christianity, concentrating upon the first book of the Bible, Genesis 1.

I urge you to study and contemplate upon it, especially noting the order of the Creation of the Natural World, from nothing, then the smallest to the largest creatures and ending with mankind. It shows us how Nature and the Animal World is important to God, Our Creator and how we have a duty to take care of it. Leaving us all with the big question, are we?

1 kilo peeled Pumpkin 50 grams of yeast 250 grams Flour 1 Egg

Padel a Fast Growing Sport

The game of Padel, from the English word paddle, was invented by Mexican Enrique Corcuera in 1962. A friend of his was Spanish nobleman Prince Alfonso de Hohemlohe, a real estate developer on the Costa del Sol and he was so taken with the game that he built 2 courts in Marbella in 1975 and so the game came to Spain. Since then, it gradually gained popularity here and today it is the game with the fastest growth of any sport. It is played in 75 countries and is growing fast in the UK, with many courts now being built.

Padel is a doubles game played on an enclosed glass walled rectangular court approximately 20m long and 10m wide. The floor is carpet topped with sand. The ball is





a tennis ball with slightly less pressure and the racquets are short and solid. Serving is underhand and scoring is as in tennis. The ball can be bounced on to the back or side walls but not hit directly on to them, so in effect it is a mixture of tennis and squash.

I run two sessions, each of an hour and a half, one on municipal courts in Teulada, and the other at privately run Sol The ga Park in Moraira. In each group we have 25-30 members and we usually take 3 courts at each venue each week. We play with different partners each time but stick with the same partner for the session. We have greatly enjoyable friendly, yet competitive, games- and always social sessions in the bar afterwards!




Do Pets have Souls

People know that I am an animal lover, having two cats and a dog. Therefore, I often get the above question addressed to me and so I thought that I would examine some thinking about it. My short response is usually 'I do not know', 'I am not sure', you will understand why I think this way, by the end of this short note.

I would like to start, by saying a few words, on the nature of 'one's soul'. The thinking on this is from an Italian 13th Century RC Dominican Philosopher and Theologian called St Thomas Aquinas. He determined that to have a soul, you have to have the power of 'reasoning' and as animals cannot reason, therefore they do not have a soul.

I offer some further discussion of this. What is the nature of our pet? They cannot talk, but they can certainly communicate, with 'meows', 'barks', 'wagging tails', 'eye contact' and 'hugs'. They mostly operate on 'instinct'; but can they 'think or reason', I believe they can, 'in their own way' and they have intelligence and can be trained, eg police, customs and excise and guide dogs. Look how clever guide and hearing dogs are, to care for human beings.



People have experienced, what are called OBE's, (outer body experiences), wherein they say, they have seen 'past deceased relatives and pets', within some beautiful serene and calm settings. I know a bit about it, because I had one myself, about 35 years ago, and saw, what I have just described. Did I have a glimpse of 'heaven' or was it the action of my brain?

We also have the claims of 'animal spirit' phenomena by Medians and Spiritualists. What about the dog known as Greyfriars Bobby, who in Scotland, regularly visited 'his masters grave'. From ancient Egyptology, we note the high regard that was shown by the Pharaohs, towards, the spirits of their cats.

I have no doubt that the souls of humans can go to be reunited with God in heaven. I find it hard to believe that our pets can't. It may be that they have their own form of it? I am biased, but for me my pets are 'little angels'.

I would conclude with a quote from Vet James Herriot,

I was delighted when David and Elaine asked me to write something for The Rock. It is a privilege to still be considered part of the Costa Blanca Chaplaincy in some way. However, as I write this I am aware that some time has passed since I was a member of the chaplaincy team, so some of you will have forgotten me, and there will be others I have never had the pleasure of meeting. So that makes it even kinder of you to want to know something of my story and what I am doing now.

I came from London to live in Spain in 2015 and spent three very happy years as a team priest in the Costa Blanca Chaplaincy. Towards the end of the three years, I began to fantasize about retirement an idyllic kind of retirement of quiet days with my dog, reading, writing and contemplating the mountains I had come to love.
